e're looking forward to 2022 in a big way. Most folks in early 2022 follow that up with discontent over the last two years, but our anticipation is truly forward, not avoidance, focused.

2022 is going to require a community that creates a vision

and lays strategy. It's a time of opportunity, reinvention and reinvigoration. Hancock County is changing and so is our philanthropic climate – now more than ever the work of UWHC is needed.

At our core - we help vulnerable people from all walks of life who live and work in Hancock County.

The following pages tell some 2021 impactful stats and stories. Together with our partners, amazing work is being done to keep the vulnerable safe, feed the hungry, stabilize and make lives better and offer hope. Helping vulnerable people improve their lives is the key focus of all we do.

The money raised here, stays here to help our neighbors and friends and build a stronger community.

But in this moment, I'd like to share two key 2021 foundational accomplishments, which are completely behind the scenes that will enable future success.

Managing resources wisely. We are a financially smart, lean organization that takes advantage of every source of outside funding available to stretch local dollars. We have brought money into Hancock County, fully rebuilt operational reserves, sold property,

and lowered operational costs by thirty percent and occupancy costs by sixty percent. In addition to the financial strides, Volunteers United connected people with over 7,000 in-person and virtual volunteer hours and has developed a program to match volunteers to committee and board service.

Planning the next steps shrewdly. Our 2021 Strategic Plan began with community input to define our core tenets and guiding principles. Simply put, we help vulnerable people – children, families, and older adults – improve their lives. We will continue in that lane and publish our measurable Bold Goals in 2022. We will help meet people's emergency needs while pointing them towards more sustaining resources. We are putting a line in the sand to help vulnerable children. The impacts of parental substance abuse, family struggles, schooling adaptations, and social isolation have left a big mark. We're going to see what happens when we say "Not our kids" - we are not going to lose one – in a strategic cross-sector multi-year approach.

We are pursuing our aim with determination: to measurably improve lives in Hancock County.

The United Way of Hancock County is poised and prepared for what's around the corner, grateful for our donors, partners, and volunteers. The sigh you heard at the end of 2021 was actually a deep breath meant to fuel the vigor with which we'll be hitting 2022.

Hoping your 2022 will be positively memorable too!

uring 2021, the Board of Directors for United Way of Hancock County (UWHC) and CEO, Angela DeBoskey,

recognized a need to review and update the agency's strategic plan. During the process we compiled a resource book, completed a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threat (SWOT) analysis, organized community and donor surveys, conducted brainstorming sessions, and thoroughly vetted our strategy via virtual and in-person meetings.

By September, we developed a clear vision to measurably improve people's lives in Hancock County. We defined our vision for Hancock County to be a community where every child, individual and family thrives by removing barriers and integrating all sectors - public, non-profit, private and faith. UWHC employees, board members and committees are clear in their purpose and commitment to take care of the community's vital and basic needs (safety, food, shelter) and our vulnerable children.

We defined our values and used these values to shape our culture and impact our business strategy. The six values for the UWHC are: Integrity, Teamwork, Quality, Passion, Diversity and Communication.

We established clear goals and method to monitor our KPIs monthly, quarterly, and annually. We identified barriers and formulated the strategies needed to overcome barriers and make an impact. UWHC has five areas of focus: Culture and People, Community Impact, Resource Development and Donor Engagement, Volunteer Engagement, and finally Operations and Leadership.

This past year did provide us with plenty of challenges with changes in workplace giving, the ongoing impact of COVID, and disruptions associated with moving to a new building. As usual, Hancock County stood tall with focus, determination, and commitment.

The continued success and forward momentum achieved this year is because of you – our donors, volunteers, UWHC leadership, staff and board!

As we begin 2022, we have continued to demonstrate our values. We know our direction. Through collaboration and data, we are effective in this business of changing lives.



Since its inception two years ago, Maria Sellers has been an invaluable supporter and advocate for United Way's revamped volunteer center, Volunteers United. She wants others to have access to volunteering and the growth it can foster. Volunteering, Maria said, helps you find your place in the world and connect the dots in your own life's timeline.

Maria serves on the United Way Board of Directors; is the chairwoman of VU's Volunteer Committee; and often helps when urgent needs come up in the UWHC office. She helped start the Senior Cheer program, which battles isolation amid the covid pandemic. The program connects local groups or individuals to seniors in care facilities to send cards, art, or small gifts to brighten their day. Since 2020, 2,300+ pieces of cheer have been delivered - almost all by Maria herself.

She also serves as an ambassador for Community Connections. The program is designed to help Japanese ladies, who have moved to Findlay in support of local Japan-based companies, learn more about the community, meet new people, and offer a chance to provide a helping hand. For decades, Maria served and continues to serve countless hours outside of the United Way as well - she truly inspires and is an outstanding force in the community.

Christopher is an excellent example of servant leadership and stood out among his peers. Christopher intends to pursue Education at Bowling Green State University, where he has already been accepted for the fall semester. Between his time serving in school as both Senior Class President and National Honor Society President, Christopher also spends his time with the French National Honor Society, Science National Honor Society, and as a Senior Captain of the Football Team. Philanthropically, Christopher is an Eagle Scout and has spent over 70 hours of service with the Boy Scouts of America completing various projects for needs in our county.

The Secor Scholarship is a renewable \$2,000 scholarship and a memorial to the Steven and Doris Secor bequest. Candidates for the scholarship must be a high school senior or graduate living in Hancock County who plans to attend an accredited institution of higher learning to pursue an undergraduate field of study, full time, in the subsequent academic year.

10 YEARS OF COMMUNITY IMPACT

HALT HUNGER IN HANCOCK COUNTY

The close of 2021 brought the United Way of Hancock County to 10 full years of the Halt Hunger Initiative. Halt Hunger began as a collaborative effort among several local organizations and agencies to eradicate hunger. To date, over \$1.2 million has been funded to programs county-wide to support the mission of the Halt Hunger Initiative. Presently, the Community Gardens, Christian Clearing House, West Ohio Food Bank, the Findlay Family YMCA's Feed-A-Child, and the Salvation Army are funded through this initiative.

Children, families, seniors, veterans: all demographics can be affected by food insecurity. Every day, programs supported by the Halt Hunger Initiative have been there to support those in need. A woman who utilizes the food distribution from West Ohio Food Bank writes, "I wanted to say thank you. As I age, it has become harder to keep my income up enough to afford the basics. A few times when between jobs, I have turned to West



Ohio and other emergency pantries." A teacher at a school with the Feed-A-Child program writes, "We are thankful to be able to provide weekly food bags to about 1/5 of our elementary school population from the Feed-A-Child Program. Many of our students would not have weekend meals or snacks if this service was not available, and both our school and families are very appreciative of this amazing opportunity. Thank you!"

Food insecurity can also be an unforeseen need, arising when we least expect it; being able to offset that need is something that makes our Halt Hunger programs so vital. Christian Clearing House, providing emergency food vouchers, serves people daily and works hard to wholistically care for those in need. "Alice came to CCH seeking food assistance. She was just awarded custody of her three grandchildren. Children Services had conducted an emergency placement the previous evening. Alice worked, but



with the children staying long-term, she needed to be sure she was able to provide enough food. She lacked the financial resources to provide the necessary food to feed the children—and one child, an infant, needed baby formula and diapers. This is where CCH comes in, helping those like Alice, who are facing emergencies. Our agency was able to assist immediately and make referrals to other resources for long-term solutions—alleviating the crisis. Luckily, SNAP (Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program) and WIC (Women, Infant & Children) governmental benefits will help with this family's long-term needs."

Through the Halt Hunger Initiative, hundreds of thousands of pounds of food are distributed to Hancock County residents each year. Hundreds of students have access to food on the weekends when they otherwise would not. Fresh produce is donated to local pantries to give families access to safe and healthy food. Through the Halt Hunger Initiative, a measurable improvement has been, and will continue to be made in Hancock County.

VOLUNTEERING MAKES A LASTING IMPACT

Volunteers United had a productive 2021, with programming and outreach continuing to expand. Our volunteers contributed more than 7,000 service hours to the community, a value of more than \$200,000! (Based on Independent Sector's value of a volunteer hour at \$28.54.) We are so thankful for you.

ENGAGING YOUTH VOLUNTEERS

NEW WEBSITE, GUIDANCE, AND BLUE & GOLD GOES GREEN

In the past year, Volunteers United has made great strides in connecting youth with volunteer opportunities. Many need to fulfill service hours for clubs and organizations.

In 2021, we reworked our website and created a page specific to youth. We have seen a dramatic increase in youth registrations allowing us to provide helpful guidance.

In April, UWHC partnered with the Blanchard River Watershed Partnership and Findlay High School's Honor Society to create Blue & Gold Goes Green, a litter clean-up event. Ninety students collected about 1.27 tons of litter and fulfilled 306 service hours, learning leadership skills and environmental stewardship along the way.



VIRTUAL OPPORTUNITIES HELPING SENIORS

SENIOR CHEER PROGRAM

Volunteers United's Senior Cheer program has served a dual purpose by offering an opportunity for remote volunteering while battling the necessary isolation imposed by the covid pandemic. Senior Cheer can be a card, art, small gift, anything designed to brighten someone's day.

We have connected classrooms, church groups, corporate groups, individuals, and other organizations with hundreds of Hancock County seniors. In the past two winter seasons, the community has come out in force, sending more than 2,300 pieces of cheer!





CORPORATIONS MAKE HUGE IMPACT

DAYS OF CARING

Our two Days of Caring events led to over 700 volunteers providing more than 2,800 hours of service at 103 projects, with a value to the community of more than \$80,000. Wow!

During Days of Caring, employees of area corporations and small businesses lend a hand to local organizations. Nonprofits in need of help submit projects, volunteer teams register to help, and the United Way matches up the two groups. Typical projects include landscaping, organizing, painting, planning an event, cleaning, or construction.

Our Community Connections program is designed to help Japanese ladies, who have moved to Findlay in support of local Japan-based companies, learn more about the community, meet new people, and offer a chance to volunteer each month. Local ambassadors serve alongside the ladies, forming friendships and assisting as help is needed. Their newfound friendships have been an inspiration to witness.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM CAMPAIGN SEASON



The 2021 campaign reached \$1.7 million and encompassed not only individual gifts but many different areas of our community including: corporate, commercial, education, health, mercantile, public, rural, young professionals, and financial/insurance/real estate groups.

We are thankful for the support of both corporations running workplace campaigns, which extends our reach to those working in Hancock County, along with corporate gifts which are a large part of what comprises campaign. Other large contributors include individual gifts, fundraisers, and special events. As the climate changes for giving, UWHC has adapted. We have broadened our base of workplace campaigns with over 25 new or returning companies. Apart from parts of the Corporate Division, we increased giving in every division over 2020's campaign.

Another virtual event kicked off campaign this year due to the ever changing environment of the pandemic. 419 Sings displayed contestants from around



Northwest Ohio expressed their talents through song to help raise funds and awareness of the United Way campaign. The band Klashing Black, composed of twin brothers Kyle and Kane Benner, won the contest.


